

Catfield Parish Council meeting highlights

Wednesday 7th December 2022

• **Public** – Discussed CPRE (The Countryside Charity) and CLT (Community Land Trusts).

• Cllr Price update:

- Currently focusing on Road Safety and is Planning an exhibit in Sea Palling 29th to 31st January 2023 to commemorate the 70th Anniversary of the East Coast floods.
- **Broads Authority Issues and Options Local Plan** PC to respond to the local plan.

• Environment:

- Two planters and a bench to by placed at the corner of New Road and The Street approved by PC.
- The Environmental group has planted 4000 daffodils around the village and a hedge planted at the playing field on Ludham Road.
- **Fly tipping** There is currently not much dog fouling or litter, but the gate will still be shut for winter as the cars are/will cause damage to the grass.
- **Polluted water into the Ants Broads and Marshes SSSI** Ongoing tests and visits by various authorities and organisations.
- Allotments Two drafts between PC and CUC and PC and tenant to be sent to Cllrs to review.
- **Catfield recreation ground** High risk items identified and agreed a working group to propose a guide to the cost, materials and labour required to carry out the work on these items.
- Village Hall bench Received funding for the full cost of a new Village Hall bench from an anonymous donor in memory of Queen Elizabeth II. A plaque will be displayed on the bench.
- **Highways inspection visit** Conducted and inspected with issues and concerns raised by Cllrs. Cllrs to advise inspector in writing.
- **Speeding** Raised as a concern by a Parish Cllr. Cllr price proposed some roundels for the rounds and PC agreed.
- **Grass cutting on the rond -** Costs and current agreement discussed. PC suggested that the Butterfly Conservation Officer approach the RSPB for assistance.
- Village Hall Hedge cutting, and outside lighting discussed. PC to write to the Village Hall Management Committee.
- All Saints Church Landowner installed gates opposite the Church. The car park is private but available only to those who are using the church or churchyard.
- **Poors Trust** Reasoning behind the change in appointments for trustees was clarified. The Trustees are appointed, and **ANY** Parishioner is welcome to approach the PC when the date of appointment approaches. This will be advertised at the time when the opportunity arises.

The Parish Council continue to monitor and discuss the gate closure due to fly tipping.

In the meantime, the Parish Council have decided to close the gate through the winter for safety of your vehicles and to protect the ground on the site of damage from vehicle tyres.

This month I wanted to share some details regarding the pros and cons of neutering our pets. The subject is currently at the forefront of our minds as we have seen serious uterus infections (pyometra) a number of times over recent weeks! These infections tend to occur most commonly around 6 weeks after a bitch is in season and start by causing an increase in thirst, a decrease in appetite, vomiting and sometimes a nasty smelling discharge as well. Ultimately they progress to be life-threatening unless treated, which usually involves an emergency hysterectomy.

Uterus infections are completely avoidable by neutering, but they are not the only reason that we advise neutering female dogs. Neutering massively reduces the risk of dogs developing mammary cancers in later life, but in order to see the greatest benefits they need to be neutered in their first couple of years of life, the exact timing depends somewhat on the breed and size. Neutering also prevents phantom pregnancies, cystic ovary disease and ovarian cancers. The arguments against neutering are that patients have a tendency to gain weight, although this can be controlled with diet and exercise, it can alter their coat condition and a very small percentage of bitches develop urinary incontinence in later life, once again this is usually manageable with medication. The other concern many pet owners have is with regard to the anaesthetic and the surgery. These risks are extremely low, especially in young fit animals and we now have the option of keyhole surgery to speed up recovery and reduce risks further.

There are benefits to neutering male dogs as well, although these are less profound and must be carefully weighed up for each individual in terms of their behaviour. The pros including preventing testicular cancer and reducing the incidence of prostate disease along with making them less likely to roam. It can however, exacerbate some behavioural traits if the patient is naturally nervous, so it is sensible to consult your vet first.

With cats, particularly those which go outside it is vitally important to neuter them to ensure that there are no unwanted litters of kittens.

Ultimately the decision with our canine pets is more of a personal one, but if you have any questions then please get in contact with your vets who will be able to advise you further.

There were a few left over, which have been planted alongside as spare, in case we have any failures.

Huge thanks to everyone who came out to help, on what was quite a chilly weekend. With its nine native species, we're sure the hedge will be of great benefit to wildlife but we humans will also be glad of the shelter it will provide in the future!

An attractive spot to stop and rest ...

A revised plan for the green space on the corner of The Street, and New Road was approved by the Parish Council on Wednesday 7th December. This will see a durable bench set to the side of the existing sycamore tree and two accompanying hexagonal planters that will be planted with wildlife-friendly perennials. The proposal now goes forward to Norfolk County Council Highways Department for approval.



FARMING NEWS

Finally, Rishi has come out, following intense pressure from MP's, and now likes the idea of wind turbines on land as well as out to sea. The Eco warriors don't like the idea of solar panels on prime agricultural land. I can't see Rishi letting the Government pay £66/month to every household to subsidize their electricity next year, that's around £2.5 billion a month. So now would be the time to start looking at a carbon neutral Catfield for the benefit of everyone. We've heard the pros and cons but look at your bank statements and you'll soon make your minds up that something needs to be organised. There was a brief article on TV recently which initially I thought was anti-wind turbines but actually the resident was looking at his iPad checking the wind speed and he received more money off his electricity bill the faster the turbine 500m away went round. He seemed to be saying that although he would prefer the turbine not to be there, his iPad was showing him that it needed to be there as his electricity bill was lower. Having changed most of the lights around the farm to LED's to reduce power consumption I'm now looking at heating systems in houses. We have plenty of wood around the farms, so wood burners seem the answer. The tenant gets heat and I get the house warm and damp free. The first wood burner arrived yesterday but the wood needs to be under 20% moisture and that takes 2 years to dry, so it looks like we need a giant wood store.

The muck heap cover is finished and has really tidied up a wet and dirty corner of the farm. The big question is; did the contractors take more time building it than the Parish Council spent discussing it? My money was on the contractors but I have to say I lost the bet.

I seem to be having endless e mails to and from Rural Payments Agency recently. On 30th November I had a call to say that my e mails were going into their Spam and they had found them and how many more was I going to send. Another 5 hours' worth was the answer. In December I moved onto Stewardship Capital grant claims and new Mid-Tier Stewardship agreements starting 1st January of which there were many minor issues to be resolved. The most annoying issue was a marsh renowned for Snipe, Redshank and other waders where the RPA had turned the plot down because Natural England had not signed it off. Their reasoning; it was too small an area but have since said that the birds are there and are probably breeding and therefore the application is correct. It has now gone past the application window and we'll have to apply next year. I wonder if they have considered the Snipe (the most important thing here) whose habitat has changed slightly because there is no stewardship agreement at present. Time will tell if the net result of these delays are that the Snipe have gone elsewhere. The reductions in subsidies and problems with Stewardship and SFI coupled with high fertilizer prices are beginning to cause cash flow issues on some tenanted farms. RPA really need to sort out a way forward but no, they are about to go on strike and have a three-week Christmas break.

Avian Flu is everywhere, there are dead birds in most fields which are quickly cleared up by foxes and badgers. I've heard that some foxes now have bird flu. A lot of dogs have been ill this Summer/Autumn with vets not finding anything in tests, one wonders if they have picked up a dose, however they seem to be over it now. The massive reduction in bird numbers has had an effect on the feed wheat market which has dropped some 20%.

Chef's Specials



Roasted Root Vegetable Soup

Ingredients

50ml olive oil 1 small butternut squash, peeled, seeded and cubed 2 carrots, cut into thick rounds 1 large parsnip, cubed 1 small swede, cubed 2 leeks, thickly sliced 1 onion, quartered 3 bay leaves 4 thyme sprigs, plus extra to garnish 3 rosemary sprigs 1.2 litres vegetable stock Salt and pepper Sour cream, to serve

<u>Method</u>

- 1. Preheat the oven to 180C. Put the olive oil into a large bowl. Add the prepared vegetables and toss until coated in the oil.
- 2. Spread out the vegetables in a single layer on one large or two small baking sheets. Tuck the herbs among the vegetables.
- 3. Roast for 50 minutes until tender turning the vegetables occasionally to make sure they brown evenly. Remove from the oven, discard the herbs and transfer the vegetables to a large pan.
- 4. Pour the stock into the pan and bring to the boil. Reduce the heat, season to taste, then simmer for 10 minutes. Transfer the soup to a food processor or blender (or use a hand blender) and process for a few minutes until thick and smooth.
- 5. Return the soup to the pan to heat through. Season and serve with a swirl of sour cream. Garnish each serving with a sprig of thyme.

Catfield is fortunate to have a shop and Post Office these days. In the past there were usually several shops in the village even though the population was much smaller. Most people in the past had to shop in the village because of transport problems; most families didn't have a car until the 1960s, the only alternatives were walking, cycling and between the 1880s and 1959 the train to Stalham or Yarmouth. The shopping revolution came to this area in 1963 with Latham's self-service supermarket at Potter Heigham. Village shops such as those in Catfield were definitely not self-service; shop assistants served and wrapped goods then took cash payment after adding up the bill without a computerised till.

The present shop, until the 1970s, had a large open space in the middle with counters along three sides. The shop was run by Reggie Wightman assisted by Gordon Riches. As you entered the Post Office was on the left behind a mesh grill. Gordon would shuffle around behind the counters from handing out pensions in the Post Office, to cutting and wrapping cheese, to handing out newspapers and magazines. This shop like the others, was open from I think 9am to 5pm, with early closing on Wednesday afternoons and closed all day Sunday.



Wightman's Shop

This shop and Post Office was owned from 1899 by Hugh Wightman and later by his son Reggie until about 1970 when Mr Ash took over and modernised it. There had been a shop in this building for at least a century before Wightman. John and Maria Moore ran it until the 1840s when the Barcham family took over until about 1880. It became the Post Office around 1880 when J W Huson took over and he sold it to Wightman in 1899.

Another shop which some people will remember was the White Horse Stores next to the Crown PH. The White Horse was also a pub until it closed in the 1930s and became a shop run by John and Connie Thompson who sold it to Mr and Mrs Urie in the late 1950s. Their daughter Joyce (Platford) worked as a hairdresser in one end of the shop. Through this time Nora Myhill worked in the shop. Later it was run by Shipstones and closed before 1980.



White Horse Stores

There was another shop on the corner of New Road and The Street at The Hollies. This was built in 1898 but it replaced an earlier cottage and shop. There had been a shop here since at least 1842 when Robert Rice was renting it. During the 1850s John Balls (son-n-law of Riches the wherry operator) took over and he became Catfield's first Postmaster before 1858. The Post Office was at the Hollies only while Balls ran it and transferred to its current location around 1880. For the next century The Hollies had many different shopkeepers until 1978 when Jimmy and May Miles closed it. A photo from the 1920s shows it being run as Watts and Baker who ran a delivery van as well.

A G Baker then seemed to move from The Hollies to Willow House where he ran a shop and egg-packing business in what had earlier been a butcher's shop. By 1939 this had become Jack Goodrick's Threeways Garage and there was a briefly another attempt by the Elseys to run a shop here along with the garage in the 1970s. Around the same time Mr Killett had a shop and butcher's next to Sunbury (Hi-Timbers) in The Street. There was another shop in The Street in a shed adjoining Pinehurst opposite the Sandholes run by Ollie Blaxell's wife in the 1950s and 1960s. This was popular with boys as she would sell us fireworks as well as sweets.

In Wood Street there used to be a shop which served people from there and Fenside, especially with paraffin. It was built onto the front of an old house Woodcroft in1907 by Jimmy Pert who also did a delivery service on a tricycle. This shop continued until at least the 1950s, run by his daughters Elsie (Platford) and Louisa. Before 1907 Pert ran a shop nearby in the shed adjoining the former cottage between Wood Street Farm and Latchetts. He took it over from Rebecca Thompson in the 1890s she had been there since moving from Horning around 1882. As a boy Pert lived in Wood Street and was an apprentice grocer, presumably at one of the other Catfield shops.

95% more homes are on the market today than a year ago

This is excellent news for homebuyers and landlords because as properties are no longer flying off the shelf as they did last year, the number of properties available to buy is beginning to return to long-term averages.

This means there is greater choice for buyers and this will reduce the pressure on house prices and return us to a more normal housing market for buyers (and sellers).

The average UK estate agency now has 25 homes for sale, the highest level of properties on the market since December 2021 (when it was 21 homes for sale).

This growth in properties for sale has been seen across all areas of the British Isles. This is important because when there is a more significant availability of homes for sale, this diminishes the increasing pressure on house prices.

So how does a low number of properties for sale make such a huge difference?

Coming into the early spring of 2022, the levels of properties for sale were low. It was *'Hobson's choice'* for buyers, so they had to pay top dollar to secure their home.

The value of properties that had their sale agreed upon in the early spring of 2022 (and completed their sale in September 2022) is 21.4% higher than those properties that had a sale agreed upon in the spring of 2021.

The number of properties estate agents have to offer buyers is increasing; this will boost the choice for buyers, meaning we will move into a more balanced housing market.

Nevertheless, it's vital that sellers place their properties, when they go onto the market, in line with what homebuyers are prepared to pay, given the current hit to their buying power initiated by higher interest rates.

House prices are not expected to crash in 2023, yet they will be lower than in 2022.

If you are buying and selling in the same property market, it doesn't matter what happens to property prices.

What has an effect on the value of your home is the number of properties for sale at any one time compared to the number of buyers. When there is an over-supply of homes for sale, prices go down, and with reduced demand, house prices will go down. So how do the stock levels of properties for sale compare to the past?

If you recall at the start of the article, I stated the average UK estate agency had 25 properties on their books now. In 2018/9, that average was 36 properties for sale (and for added comparison, the long-term average, since records began in 2016, is 49 homes for sale).

A great way to determine what will happen to the property market is by measuring that stock level (*i.e. the number of properties for sale*). Check once a month and see how many properties are for sale. Let me break that down for specifically and how you can judge the market from your sofa.

There are 191 properties and plots for sale now. To give context, the long-term 16-year average is 296 properties and plots for sale, yet in the credit crunch of 2008, it reached 515 properties and plots for sale at one point.

I envisage some component of scarcity to persist in the property market, meaning whilst the house prices that were being achieved in the spring of 2022 won't be replicated in 2023, it also won't fall dramatically next year.

The incentives and impetuses to move home have changed in the last six months and will continue to do so into 2023.

As I have written before, there are a larger number of mature homeowners in their 60s and 70s downsizing to help with heating bills, whilst the desire for more space means younger families will continue to look for new homes to live in, in 2023.

If younger 20-somethings can access the Bank of Mum and Dad for mortgage deposits, they will also carry on buying. This is especially true because double-digit rental inflation makes renting quite expensive compared to buying (even with the increased interest rates).

These are my thoughts on the property market this week. Do put in the comments (or send me a message) your thoughts on the matter discussed and any other property-related topic you want some advice and opinion on.

YOU SAID, WE DID

A dispersal order was issued in Stalham town centre at the end of October in direct response to antisocial behaviour (ASB) that had been taking place in the area. The order gave officers extra powers during a certain period of time, to direct people to leave the area and not return within 48 hours if they were suspected of causing ASB.

Regular patrols were undertaken in Stalham and known areas of antisocial behaviour, particularly during half term, and during and after the dispersal order had finished, and a number of young people were spoken to.

A man was sentenced after stealing a £35K boat from Barton Broad last year, following an investigation.






