We have a mixture of fundraising and project activity to tell you about this month.

Litter pick

Shortly after that, on <u>Saturday 11th March</u>, we'll be running another litter pick, between 10 am and 12 pm starting at the Village Hall. You don't have to do the whole two hours, just half an hour of your time will help us remove plastic and other waste from around our village. We'll have all the equipment you need, just bring a pair of gloves.

Jubilee Corner

We have had permission from North Norfolk District Council to place perennial planters and a bench on the grassed area at the corner of The Street and New Road. North Norfolk unsuccessful in their levelling up bid for a 4th time.


Cllr Taylor update:

According to our calendars, March is here again but the month of March isn't just about celebrating St. Patrick's Day and the start of spring. In fact in 2020, did it ever stop being March? That year, according to our emotions, March never left. Yes, March 2023 marks 3 years since the COVID-19 pandemic sent the fortunate among us inside to work from home, bake sourdough, and socialize via Zoom while the less fortunate were forced to continue to work at great risk to their own health. It was a long, hard time, but the end is in sight—daylight saving gives us more light on March 26th, and the nation-wide vaccine rollout has given us hope of a more normal life. There is hope to be found, too, in the difference between March 2020 and March 2023. Then, we were fearful and confused, unsure of the safest way to conduct ourselves as events were cancelled right and left. Now, we know so much more about the virus. We know what to do to limit the risk. We think there are plenty of reasons for hope this March 2023, but still all is not well with the world with wars, famines and natural disasters affecting many peoples.

So to return to St Patrick.... St Patrick's Breastplate is a protective prayer ascribed to St Patrick with which Celtic monks used to start their day. The hymn is several verses long; the last two are especially memorable and moving:

Christ be with me, Christ within me, Christ behind me. Christ before me. Christ beside me. Christ to win me. Christ to comfort and restore me.

Christ beneath me, Christ above me, Christ in quiet. Christ in danger. Christ in hearts of all that love me, Christ in mouth of friend and stranger.

FARMING NEWS

Three weeks ago, the weather suddenly dried up after 7-8 weeks of intermittent rain and off we went, flat out, burning diesel, winter ploughing is up to date but I still have sugar beet to harvest. Winter cereals look very good and I'm starting to think about applying Poly Sulphate soon, you may have seen it being mined 50km off shore from Cleveland, well under the sea, on Countryfile last week. Lambs are beginning to be born, all singles until the twins this morning. I have to say twins are lovely but difficult to fatten on the grass they get to eat plus the ewes lose a lot of weight, which they then put back on later in the Summer. I prefer singles which are fatten quickly and go straight off to market and give the ewes less stress. Hedge planting is finished for the time being but it has sparked a lot of interest from fellow farmers eager to improve their farms. I have provided Catfield Environmental Group with information on RPA Capital Grants available to farmers that could be used to improve areas of the village for the benefit of all. We now need a village plan to maximize the environmental benefits these grants can provide.

HLS and Mid Tier Stewardship agreements have all been renewed for 5 years with some new applications to be made by May.

Sustainable Farming Incentive is exactly what it says it is. How we improve our soils is the first brick in this new incentive wall. Adding manures and having over wintered cover are the first bricks soon to be followed by six more standards this Summer which include hedges-glad I've been busy planting. There are also incentives in animal health to sign up for vet's visits. My vet recently visited to fix a ewe and commented that he assumed sheep farming was not my main income. That could have been taken two ways, either I'm a useless shepherd or he noticed some other income streams. I told him that the lambing field was the most profitable on the farm and I could see him thinking that I was probably a better shepherd than he thought but then he realised I was talking about the turbine and solar panels in the field.

2023 is the last claim of BPS, from 2024 it is being converted into a de-linked payment and slowly reduced to nothing in 2027. By then the building blocks of SFI will all be in place and our sustainable farming will be thriving. I somehow think it won't be.

I saw a great cartoon last week. Two cavemen were sitting in the cave discussing what a great environment they lived in but something was not right, they had pure water, clean air, plenty of exercise, free range meat everywhere, organic food yet nobody lived past thirty. I wonder if that's where we are heading with SFI? Don't worry Clarkson's Farm is back, he'll have some good ideas on how to move forward sustainably.

World food commodity prices seem more volatile than normal and its difficult to predict what is a good price because next week its sure to have risen or decreased by £10/t. What is starting to occur is empty shelves in shops and customers are being able to see that paying the correct price for good food is the way forward to ensure there is food along with cutting waste. That should give farmers the confidence to invest in their farms to produce the quality produce our customers expect to buy. Over the last year the percentage of imported food rose again, that is worrying and will lead to shortages as global shipping comes under all sorts of pressures. To be fair to RPA they are trying to help with grants for certain equipment we need but it is expensive and not proven yet.

If you've ever considered moving house before and read blogs about where to start, there is almost always information about decluttering.

Why? Because cluttered homes are harder to sell.

And, if you appear to not have enough room for your belongings, your house must not be big enough, right?

Particularly good for the loft and the back of the garage. But don't forget to label the boxes with what you have inside; otherwise, you'll probably never find anything again. And this will mean that some of your belongings are already packed for your move.

Use drawer dividers: These will provide separate compartments within your drawers and will keep things neat and organised and stop the 'rummage' effect.

Use the space that you have: Perhaps you can hang items inside the doors in cupboards. Or use shelf dividers to use the height inside your cupboards, effectively adding another shelf.

Storage solutions are the perfect way to make your home feel organised and tidy and ultimately easier to keep clean. We have all seen those mesmerising videos of people stacking their food cupboards, items decanted into matching glass jars and baskets that fit things in perfectly. In a busy family household, it's more likely that your cupboards are stuffed and overflowing than neatly stacked and stored.

But there is a connection to selling a property here. Clear, uncluttered homes appear more spacious, and viewers will look inside cupboards! If you are planning a house move, the easiest solution is to use stacking boxes to store items you won't need in the immediate future. This keeps superfluous things tidy and organised and gives you a head start on packing!

Chef's Specials



Here is a recipe which is easy to make with children or perfect for serving with a drink when they visit.

Put the biscuits in a plastic bag and let them crumb them with a rolling pin.

Marshmallow slices

Ingredients

100g butter
3tbsp golden syrup
25g drinking chocolate
225g crumbled digestive biscuits
50g mini marshmallows

For the topping

125g melted chololate

Method

- 1. Wet a 17.5cm (7 inch) square cake tin and then line with cling film.
- 2. Measure the syrup, butter and drinking chocolate into a large pan and stir gently over a low heat until the butter melts.
- 3. Take off the heat and allow to cool slightly. stir in the crumbled biscuit and marshmallows. Mix until thoroughly blended.
- 4. Turn the mixture into the tin and level the top, press down firmly with the back of a spoon and put in the fridge to become firm or overnight.
- Remove from the fridge and cover with the melted chocolate, leave for about 1 hour to set.
- 6. Peel off the cling film and cut into squares.

Tip: Cheese is too expensive to throw away because it had a touch of mould. Prevent it from getting mouldy in the first place by wrapping the cheese in a napkin soaked in salt water before storing it in the fridge.

ThinkWilt on Tyranny

Declaration of interest. About a year ago, a member of ThinkWilt's family announced an intention of peaceful protest against new fossil fuel exploration, and has served two prison sentences as a direct result, ThinkWilt supports these protests, some (but not all) spoken to in this community have agreed, and most (though not all) respect that individual's right to protest.

"Civil Disobedience" encompasses all forms of (usually) peaceful protest against what activists perceive to be injustice or moral wrong. The protests are generally mildly to seriously disruptive, as a means of drawing attention to the issue in question. Examples, excluding specific industrial action through strikes, include the Peasants' Revolt of 1381, the Suffragette Movement in the early 1900s, protests against nuclear weapons during and after the Cold War, and ongoing opposition to transport schemes that activists believe to be environmentally damaging.

The Suffragette Movement succeeded in its immediate aims, though true equality for women and freedom from abuse are still far away. Most of the other movements were suppressed, violently or otherwise, or ignored by those in power who could rely on military might, and later on legitimate parliamentary majorities. Examples of activists whose apparent failure was turned to success by divine intervention, such as the Prophet Daniel, and Jesus of Nazareth, are acknowledged with respect.

The Just Stop Oil (JSO) protesters are in the same mould as their predecessors. They believe that continuing fossil fuel exploration can only accelerate the climate change that will seriously disrupt human lives in the foreseeable future. One protester wrote from prison in a letter published in *The Mail*, 'I felt I had no choice but to step away from everything I love and accept the fear and uncertainty that brings. That is because stopping new fossil fuel licences matters more than anything else. Doing nothing is a deliberate choice that I can no longer justify." Her statement has the respectable precedent, "The only thing necessary for the triumph of evil is for good men to do nothing," commonly but falsely attributed to the political thinker Edmund Burke (1730–97), but closely paraphrased in a longer passage in a speech by the philosopher John Stuart Mill in 1867. The Church Times cartoonist Dave Walker seems to agree. Known to many for his cartoons poking gentle fun at the eccentricities of the Anglican Church and its members. Mr Walker is devoting his new series to "The Planet" including a succinct statement of the JSO protesters' arguments.

There is a legitimate debate to be had about how to make best use of existing fossil fuel stocks while transitioning to renewables, but the Government will not engage with the protesters' arguments. Its reaction is to pass laws to suppress successively more harshly the means of protest. That is its democratic right under our respected parliamentary system. Some refer to this exercise of power as a "tyranny of the majority".

A Mystery Bible

My wife's mother, Helen Watson was descended from the Riches family from Catfield. Helen lived at Ludham as did my wife in her early years. After Helen died, we were clearing out her house and we found an old family bible. It belonged to the Gammie family who lived in Marnock in Scotland. Ann had no idea why Helen had it, so I started to investigate this mystery.



Charlotte Gammie must have moved to Catfield and married Charles Eagle in 1888. Charlotte was the headmistress at Catfield school and Charles went on to own a cycle shop in Catfield. Charles died in 1926 and Charlotte died in 1937.

Charlotte and Charles are buried in Catfield Churchyard along with Amy Page who died in 1886, Rachael Page who died in 1910 and John Page who died in 1914. So, what is the connection between the Eagle family and the Page family? The 1881 Census shows Charles living with the Page family and his occupation was then a carpenter likely working for John Page, a Wheelwright.



Charlotte moved to Ludham when she retired, and she lived in School Road. That is where my wife's grandmother lived.

My wife's grandmother, Helen Skillern, was known to be a very caring person. She and her husband, Fred, had suffered significant hardship during their marriage. Times must have been hard for them. They had met when Fred was serving in the Army in Norfolk during WW1. They returned to south Wales where he was a miner. They returned to Ludham during the miners' strike because he was offered a job by one the Riches family who had a building business. Fred suffered a serious accident which prevented him from working.

Whilst researching all this I discovered was that Charlotte Eagle left her estate to Frank Riches and Helen Skillern. The estate was worth £575, which is £41500 today. We can only assume Charlotte was so grateful for the care and support in the last few years of her life. That inheritance must have made all the difference to the Skillerns.

It is amazing my wife's mother held on to the bible. Our quest is to find a member of the Gammie family and return it. I wonder if a reader has a photo of Charlotte.






