Neospora caninum by Ben Crowter, Westover Vets

It might feel annoying to see that a farmer has put up a sign saying 'Please clean up after your dog' or something like that. After all, what harm can a little dollop of dog poo do? Well, it turns out, quite a lot. Neospora caninum, a parasitic disease that is passed between dogs and cattle, has recently emerged as the leading cause of pregnancy abortion in cattle in the UK. Cows are pregnant for about the same amount of time as women, around 9 months, and it's one of the most gut-wrenching things for a farmer to go to check his cattle one morning to find a seven-month-old fetus lying on the pasture. And knowing that an irresponsible dog walkers may be to blame is, understandably, hard to accept. It can be tricky for dog-owners to understand too; after all, their beloved pooch may be the picture of health. But that's just the problem, dogs infected with Neospora show no symptoms of illness and there are no tests to diagnose it. Yet once infected, they remain so for life. Your dog could easily pick up the parasite on its daily jaunts through farmland and neither you or it would be any the wiser. So the safest thing to do, always, is pick up after your dog, especially when in contact with pastures grazed by cattle.

CATFIELD PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS WEDNESDAY 3rd APRIL 2024

Public Update

No issues raised

Councillor Bayes Update

Councillor Bayes advised that much of his and Councillor Taylor's time had been taken up with the Milestones planning application. This was discussed at this point as the application was before North Norfolk District Council's (NNDC) Development Committee the following day. A report had been prepared by the PC setting out its objections to the application and this had been submitted to NNDC. Councillor Harris would represent the PC at the Development Committee meeting. District Councillors Taylor and Bayes would also speak.

Councillor Price Update

 Councillor Price was not able to attend the PC meeting but had emailed his report. The Environment Agency had brought in two engagement officers to the Broadland Futures Initiative. Norfolk County Council (NCC) is supporting tree planting and he will try to help the Catfield Environmental Group acquire some fruit trees. A spare SAM2 had been acquired by the PC and the cost of the post and installation will be provided from Councillor Price's highway budget.

Catfield School

• An update from the school, dated 25th March 2024, was read by Councillor Johnson. All was in place for the transfer to be part of St Benet's Multi Academy Trust from 1st April 2024. The letter set out the arrangements in place regarding flooding at the school. The school thanked the PC for its interest and support. The PC acknowledged the assurances given in the letter from the school.

Planning

- Initiative on the Mushroom Site The PC was currently awaiting possible meeting dates with Sandra King and other heads of department from NNDC to discuss the above site. A draft letter had been prepared previously setting out the PC's points for discussion. The PC discussed a few amendments to the letter which will be finalised by Councillor Harris. Once a meeting date had been agreed, the letter will be sent to NNDC.
- Update on Milestones as above
- Siting of mobile home on land off School Lane/Ludham Road The application for a Certificate of Lawful Development previously submitted to NNDC by the landowner had been refused. The PC to write to NNDC asking that enforcement action now be taken.

CATFIELD PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS (cont'd)

- Store Galore Application for retrospective planning permission The PC to write to NNDC expressing its disappointment that no
 progress appeared to have been made on the application. The letter
 would also point out that the sound and movement monitoring was
 unconvincing.
- Malthouse Corner, Malthouse Lane, Catfield Change of Use of the land to a caravan site for single caravan for Gypsy and Traveller Residential Use; hard standing, portacabin and installation of cess pit (part retrospective) - The NNDC planning website to be checked to see if an up-to-date HSE assessment had been carried out by NNDC. All the documents relating to this application needed to be reviewed with a view to deciding how best to proceed.
- PF/24/0425 Demolition of single storey rear extension and replacement with two storey extension on similar footprint – The Hollies, The Street, Catfield. - The PC had no objection
- Broads Authority Notice of two consultations for information only

Highways & Road Safety

- Village Hall Bus Shelter The PC had been awarded a grant towards
 the cost of a new bus shelter. The paperwork for the acceptance of the
 grant was signed at the meeting. A visit to the bus shelter supplier to
 ensure the quality of the shelter to be arranged.
- Other Highways/Road Safety Issues A parishioner had written to the PC regarding the condition of the road in Dale Lane caused by farm vehicles. The PC to write to the farmer.

Environmental

- Catfield Environmental Group The next litter pick will be in September. The next footpath walk is at 10.00 am on 13th April, starting at the Church. Information is being collected for an interpretation board at Sandholes. Feedback is required from Catfield United Charities and the PC regarding a potential community orchard at Catfield Common. The group responded to an appeal from the school for help in maintaining its garden and pond. The next Bingo session is on 26th April. There will be a plant/garage sale on 19th May.
- Update re Clearance of trees at the end of Lea Road Although NNDC had been chased with regard to potential action by the Forestry Commission, due to the holidays, no update was available.

CATFIELD PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HIGHLIGHTS (cont'd)

Flooding and related Sewage Issues

 Catfield Staithe/Wood Street/Plumsgate Road - Anglian Water had confirmed that it was ground and surface water which had knocked out the systems. The ditch into Plumsgate looked as though it was full of sewage.

Correspondence

- Cannon Wake Court Compensation All paperwork had been completed and hand delivered to NNDC. It was hoped that the outstanding compensation payments would be received shortly.
- **New Notice Board** Councillor Edwards is to follow up on potential suppliers.
- Condition of road and overhanging branches on junction of New Road with A149 - An email had been received from a parishioner regarding the above. The PC to contact highways.
- Precept The clerk had responded to the parishioners who had raised questions regarding the precept and would respond to further questions raised by one of the parishioners.

An extraordinary meeting of the PC was held on the 20th March 2024. The sole item on the Agenda was discussion of the PC's written response to further consultation on the Milestones application. Aline's Story

In Burundi, malnourishment and poverty affect more than 70% of the population, making survival a daily struggle. Jobs and food are hard to come by, and those who have homes often have no electricity or running water.

For Aline, life was a constant struggle. She was married young and gave birth to her eldest son, when she was just 14 years old; she also experienced constant abuse from her violent husband.

Then, Aline faced even more devastation. Her husband married another woman, forcing Aline to flee. He prevented her from taking their children with her; she wandered the streets, asking anyone for a place to sleep. Those who showed her kindness would let her stay for two or three days, it was difficult.

Hungry, scorned and alone, Aline took her first step towards her new life. She started by participating in a transformative three-day community workshop, funded by <u>Christian Aid</u>. And came out with amazing knowledge and skills, and a restored sense of hope and energy.

She was taught how to form a Village Savings and Loans Association (VSLA) and establish a steady income. VSLAs mean people can save for their future and borrow money to kickstart small rural businesses. With all she had learned, Aline's dream of getting her children back finally felt possible.

With a small start-up loan, Aline started trading avocados and peanuts locally. With her profits, she bought a bicycle so she could transport greater quantities of goods to markets further afield. Eventually, her hard work had finally paid off, and she had earned the money she needed to rent a house.

Once Aline secured a home for herself, her three eldest sons were able to escape their father and join her.

Today, Aline lives peacefully on her own plot of land in a remote village in the Kayogoro Commune in Makamba Province. She's baked her own bricks and is building a strong home for her and her children in every sense.

Now Aline can afford food, clothes and essential healthcare for her family. She's also purchased solar panels so her children can do their evening homework by electric light. Aline can not only look ahead to her children's future now, but her own too.

In the next five years she hopes to expand her current wholesale business by selling a range of goods, so that one day she can buy a mill.

Mollie Ewart 31.10.1928 – 03.02.2024



Barry and Jan are sad to announce the passing of Mollie on 03 February 2024. She was a much loved mother, sister in law, aunt and friend.

Mollie was born in Ludham. After leaving school she worked on several farms in the area. She went to London to work as a nanny and in later life worked at Ross foods.

She married Jack Chapman in All Saints Church Catfield on 16th August 1947. They were married for 50 years until his sad passing in 1997. They lived on Ludham Airfield in a Nissan Hut before moving to Long Lane in Catfield and enjoyed gardening growing their own flowers and vegetables. Their son Barry was born in 1955. When he married and moved to Wales Mollie made several journeys by coach and a few by air to visit them but would never move over there. She was a Norfolk girl through and through.

After her retirement she loved being at home with her dogs, birds and pottering in her large garden. She was also a prolific knitter. She knitted for the British Heart Foundation and for stillborn babies at the Norwich Hospital.

Mollie found happiness again with Bill and moved to Limes Road. Unfortunately this was short lived when he died 18 months later. She then moved to the corner bungalow where she took great pleasure in creating her garden which gave an explosion of colour year on year especially the begonias in the summertime which were her favourites. It was also the perfect location for many people to chat with her as they passed by.

Mollie enjoyed a good and active life into her 90's until the last year when after 2 operations for breaking her hips her independence was reduced which she found very frustrating but she battled on with her mantra 'You Just Have To Do It'. She passed away peacefully at James Paget with Barry and Jan at her side knowing that she was very much loved by family and friends.

Barry and Jan would like to thank relatives and friends for their help, love and support for Mollie and themselves over the years. Mollie wished for contributions to Ludham surgery if people so desired and we were pleased to forward donations to the value of £387 which they were extremely grateful for. Rest in peace dear Mollie you will be sadly missed.

News and happenings - Catfield Environmental Group, May 2024

Catfield School garden

In April, members responded to a request in this magazine from Catfield School for help with their lovely garden and pond. We held two sessions around Easter, when we tidied up the raised beds and paving and cleared the pond of invasive weed. We have also added some plants for instant colour and sown some wildflower seeds, which we hope will germinate in a month or so and provide interest and colour for pupils and staff later in the growing season. Any parents or residents who would like to help with this please do get in touch.

Ancient Trees

A group of members walked from the church up to Johnny Crowe's Staithe in mid April on the lookout for notable trees that could be added to the Woodland Trust's Ancient Tree Inventory. We found several elderly oaks on both sides of the track extending from Sharp Street past Cobb's Farm to the staithe. One in particular caught our eye and so we measured the trunk (4.5 metres in girth) and took some photos. We hope that the Woodland Trust will in due course send out a verifier to check that the tree meets the criteria for inclusion.

The Street/New Road corner

We hope you have enjoyed the purple and yellow tulips in the planters. These will be replaced by summer-flowering plants in due course, and we are also awaiting delivery of some wildflower plug plants that will be planted around the site. They're going to be a bit later than expected due to the cold, wet weather, and we may not have them until the beginning of May. Please keep looking at our Facebook page for the date of our planting session and come and help if you can.

A broader remit for the group

Our group ran a survey and workshop for members in March looking at our past and planned activities and what we felt about our current stated aims. Members agreed they would like to broaden the group's remit to work more widely for the benefit of the village, and we will be discussing this further in upcoming meetings.

We will be holding another plant sale alongside the popular Garage Sale on Sunday 19th May. NEW LAND-BASED ACTIVITY TO KEEP HISTORIC WHERRIES SAILING

Supporters of Wherry Yacht Charter Charitable Trust followed a route on land rather than water for an inaugural fundraising hike to mark National Walking Month in May.

The new Hathor Trail starts and finishes in Ludham, with the midway point at How Hill where the pleasure wherry Hathor is moored and open for viewings during the sailing season (May to September).

The six-mile route follows public footpaths and quiet country lanes with sections along the banks of the River Ant and Crome's Broad.

Along the way there are short stops where WYC volunteer and walk guide Gary Jones describes the history of various points of interest.

The Hathor Trail is easy walking and takes about four hours with stops to complete, including a tour of the wherry at How Hill.

"This is a new initiative to raise the funds needed by our charity to preserve, maintain and operate five of the remaining eight wherries in the world. Our main source of income is from scheduled sailings and charters but not everybody wants to sail on one of our boats so we are hoping this land-based activity will appeal to them as an alternative way of supporting our work," says WYC Trustee Judith Keogh.

Farming News

My Sustainable Farming Incentive scheme has started although I have to say I don't fully understand what is "sustainable" about it. I've picked options that don't really impact on the sustainable farming operation I have. Some farmers have really engaged with the scheme and put large parts of their land into bird and bee options. Rural Payments Agency are now concerned that farmers realized this was too good to be true and have capped some options at 25% of the farmers' land. Still the scheme is good. My two Mid-Tier Stewardship agreements are bearing fruit with the payment options increasing. The down side is that I spend too much time on the application process and getting the various permissions I require. Twice now I've had e-mails to say the option I've requested "might be on a protected site" and that I need Natural England's permission for the option. I have to say that at no point was I considering an option to dig up a protected site or potentially damaging a site. It turns out that the maps RPA use which have the protected sites superimposed on them are slightly out by a couple of meters. So, although I knew I owned part of the Wensum SAC site (the river) I was not planning on grazing sheep on it as they might have been swept down river. The other is that it turns out that I own part of the Ant Broads & Marshes SSSI- or at least a ditch in it. I've had panic phone calls at weekends from RPA staff who think I may have started works without the correct permission being in place. I can't do anything, the land is flooded.

I've recently passed my annual audit for traceability in crop production, without any issues. I've been through the farm's insurance because there have been some changes which hadn't been picked up. Now I've had a phone call from the Environment Agency saying that there has been a complaint and a report sent to them. All I know is that there is a grid reference number but I'm not allowed to know where it is. The officer said the problem was at Longmoor and was polluting Catfield Fen, which makes no sense as they are a long way apart. So, I suggested they send me the report so I had a rough idea what to look for. Next day I receive a "Freedom of Information Act (2000)" note saying I'll receive the report in one month. That's helpful.

Even though the weather has been reasonably dry, groundwater levels are still high in the lower lying areas of the farm, making cropping decisions difficult. Neighbours are still being encouraged to clean out ditches to get rid of water- its beyond me why they don't keep ditches clean, they must realise their actions are causing problems for everyone. Many still don't realise that they have an obligation to keep the water flowing and not to hold up water.

The Broads Authority/Forestry Commission deer survey came out. We have 4000+ deer in the area! and you guessed it; the hot spot is Catfield Fen. This is quite surprising as the majority of the deer had left the area during the survey in February as it was too wet. We now have a meeting to decide what to do about them. I'm sure fencing protected sites will be discussed but we really need a cull on a large scale. I've been saying for a few years that Muntjac numbers are decreasing as the Chinese Water Deer increase in number as they seem to be quite aggressive to Muntjac but some bright spark seems to think CWD are rare and shouldn't be culled. We are also starting to think that some of the rare plants are being eaten, I've seen aerial shots of deer tracks which give us an idea of what they have been eating. Normally its my crops but I'll start seeing if Wild Carrot is on their menu. That's the plant the Swallowtail Butterflies lay their eggs on.

Rhubarb, Apple and Hazelnut Tart

Ingredients

2tbsp plain flour

1 block readymade shortcrust pastry

90g butter

160g caster sugar

2 eggs

150g plain flour

130g ground hazelnuts

2 apples

2 stalks of rhubarb

1 tsp ground cinnamon

Method

- 1. Working on a floured countertop, roll out the pastry to a thickness of 5mm. Line a buttered and floured tart pan. Chill for 30 minutes.
- 2. Soften the remaining butter. Add 80g sugar. Blend the mixture well. One by one add the eggs. Add the flour and 80g of ground hazelnuts. Set aside.
- 3. Peel the apples, core them and cut them into thin slices. Peel the rhubarb and cut it into small pieces. Mix the leftover sugar, cinnamon and ground hazelnuts together.
- 4. Preheat oven to 140C 150C.
- 5. Take the prepared tart pan and arrange alternating layers of apple slices, rhubarb pieces and the sugar-cinnamon-hazelnut mixture. Top off with the mixture prepared in Step 2. Bake for 45-50 minutes. Check to see if cooked through by inserting a knife blade into the centre of the cake, it should come out clean.
- 6. Cool completely before turning out.

ThinkWilt holds on while they ignore his call

The title refers to a phrase coined by the US cartoonist Scott Adams in his Dilbert comic strip. The eponymous hero, employee of a corporate bureaucracy, who copes with micro- and mis-management through a mixture of naïveté and cynicism, is pictured on the telephone to a call centre. From the earpiece issues the exhortation, "please hold on while we ignore your call."

Well, we've all been there, but ThinkWilt is intrigued by the variety of forms this "we're too busy to speak to you" can take, as follows:

Go away and use the website. There may be some who genuinely don't know that the website can provide some answers and functionality, and who are genuinely capable of engaging with it. However, even the reasonably IT-literate ThinkWilt is wary of doing anything important on a first visit, preferring first to confirm with a so-called "live agent" that he has the right end of the cybernetic stick. In fairness, some systems accept that the caller may actually *need* to speak to a human and graciously offer the option to hold on, but still every minute or so extol the virtues of the website. "Press 1 to not hear this message again" would be helpful.

Press 1 for a callback- you will not lose your place in the queue. It is probably factually true that the underlying computer system can arrange for the telephone call. However, it is highly likely that the call will not get through your telephone's screening system or will cut off after two rings, just as you're getting the phone out of your pocket. Then you really DO lose your place.

<u>The embarrassingly insincere apology</u> takes several forms. It's usually preceded by "we're VERY busy" and ends with "we're trying REALLY hard to answer your call", or similar. The former is self-evident. The latter has nothing to do with the diligence of individual agents; it is the result of a conscious decision by management to reduce staff numbers and hence costs, to a point just short of, in the private sector a serious loss of business, or in the public sector an outcry of sufficient volume to engage the attention of politicians and the media.

The American cartoonist and humorist James Thurber (1894-1961), who wrote and drew about, among other things, the absurdities of everyday life, was a literary giant of his own generation, and maybe a precursor of *That was the week, that was, Monty Python*, the *Hitchhiker's Guide* - and even the humble ThinkWilt. In one of his hilarious pieces he claimed to have discovered at his local exchange a "Sympathiser", to whom he asked to be connected in order to relate his latest tale of woe. The operator, who of course knew him, let him down lightly and explained that he had simply misheard "supervisor".

"Press 9 to be connected to the Sympathiser" should be compulsory.

NWT Hickling Broad

Early spring has consisted of several windy days. Despite this, amidst the bluster, the warmth of the sun can be felt and evidence of the progression of the season is clear to both see and hear. It heralds the arrival of migrants aplenty. The Sallows lining the ronds and reedbeds are alive with the melancholy cadence of Willow Warbler song, whilst Blackcaps warble their rich and fruity notes from the drier areas of scrub. Water Rails, sounding for the world like tiny piglets, squeal their excitement from the depth of the reedbeds, 'sharming' their prospective mates. Sedge Warblers are parachuting their scratchy song-flights above the scrubbier areas of the marsh and the skulking Cettis' Warblers burst forth their strident territorial notes, proclaiming their presence even as they remain unseen, low in the bramble and birch scrub along the water courses. Bearded Tits 'ping' their way around the reedbeds searching for favourable nesting sites, the spectacular males displaying their black, gloriously elongated, mandarin moustaches that contrast so wonderfully with the powder-blue of their heads. Amidst this frenetic activity, at least six Bitterns are currently booming out their resonant presence and the local Cranes continue to trumpet and dance out on the grazing marshes.

Our celebration of the life of Emma Turner continues into May with the exhibition of her photographs at the Visitor Centre. And specific Emma Turner boat trips, piloted by our informed boat operators, run over the weekend of 11th-12th May. 


